Rectors' Report

"Oh sing to the LORD a new song; sing to the LORD, all the earth! Sing to the LORD, bless his name, tell of his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvellous works among all the peoples!"

(Ps.96:1-3)

One of the highlights of 2019 for me was the preaching series we did on **evangelism**, especially the testimonies given by Ed, Maggie, Kirsten, Alan, Norm, Gail, Louise, and Lara. They reflect the unique and diverse ways that God works in and through us to declare his glory among the nations. That's what Psalm 96 talks about. It tells a testimony of God the unique Saviour, Creator and Ruler, and invites all people to join in worship of the reigning King. It is a fitting climax to all the texts we preached on last fall.

Psalm 96 has two basic reflexes: singing, and sharing. There is a very strong outward focus, but before the church **tells**, it **sings**.

This Psalm is wrapped in **worship**: our hearts are made to worship, to sing praises, to tell good news. This Psalm was sung in full with minor adaptations by King David and all his subjects in 1 Chronicles 16, as an expression of praise and gratitude for the successful move of the ark to Jerusalem.

Verse 9 of this Psalm appears on page 3 of the Book of Common Prayer, as an invitation: "O worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness: let the whole earth stand in awe of him."

All the cosmos sings for joy in v11–12: the heavens, the earth, the sea, the fields, the forest, and all that is in them. The whole universe vibrates with the melody and harmony of the glory of God. I am conscious of the Lord's work in SJR to form us not just evangelistically, but as worshipers.

We have something to share because we know whom we worship: the One God who is good, gracious, and glorious; wise, wonderful, and sovereign. We exist at his pleasure, and have been granted life eternal through Jesus his Son. We want to be a Christ-centered, Biblically faithful, and relationally warm community whose worship (not just on Sunday mornings) is infectious, and who has something to share with those outside.

I am always amazed, looking back, at the heart and health of this congregation. You are eager and affectionate, creative and gracious. I am so thankful to be entrusted with Christ's flock at SJR, but the older I get the more undeserving I feel. God is merciful to me and to us, and we have known his good hand upon us.

Early in 2019 after a comprehensive process we hired Rev. Guy Bellerby as our new Associate Minister. Much work and prayer went into this, and I cannot be more pleased with the outcome. Guy has brought great experience, a tender heart and vigorous mind, and theological clarity. It is a privilege for me to serve once again with my old friend, and our ministry is strengthened by his presence.

In the Spring of 2019 we first heard from Trinity Lutheran Church (TLC) about their desire to move their Chinese Fellowship into the Nave on Sunday mornings. After several months of dialogue, prayer, and seeking best possible solutions, we committed to a transition to the Hall, now underway. This has taken an enormous amount of work by many many people at SJR, but I am pleased at the outcome. The move has been way smoother than it might have been, and you all have been most gracious in your help and financial generosity. I think this move will strengthen us, as well as TLC. It is a reminder that our home is with Christ, seated in the heavenly places (Ephesians 1:20), and that we are 'strangers and exiles' on this earth.

In 2019 a few new things happened by the grace of God including: Prayers for Healing, and Anointing with Oil, which we will continue in 2020 every fifth Sunday (4 times per year). We highlighted one of our four mission partners each Quarter. We enjoyed many testimonies on Sunday mornings, something I have wanted for many years. We had a Baptism in a swimming pool. We enjoyed a Seder Supper during Holy Week. We started offering Holy Communion at two assisted livng homes in Vancouver and North Vancouver. Owen Vint got married. Allan Tan got married. Rachael Cheung got published. We hosted an SJR Gallery and Open Mic event. We met five times at different SJR family homes for Parish Neighbourhood Prayer, remembering to keep our city in prayer to hear about and respond to Jesus. The quantity and quality of Sunday music, special events, and volunteer musicians is staggering.

In 2019 we were blessed with growth in numbers: our Average Sunday Attendance lifted from 71 in 2018 to 81 last year. Not every person connected with SJR is able to come every Sunday, though we want people to not forsake meeting together. This is so important to the fabric of koinonia-fellowship in Christ. What a joy it has been to welcome many new people from diverse cultures and backgrounds, and to be encouraged by so many lively stories of faith.

My prayer for us in 2020 is that we will continue to deepen our Discipleship, Widen our Witness, Build our sense of Belonging, and Strengthen the Saints in other churches. I'm greatly aware that we stand on the shoulders of the saints who have gone before (and some in SJR whose loss we feel deeply), and have shown us how to "guard the good deposit" presented to us in the pages of the Bible.

I want to acknowledge the Staff of SJR (Guy, Krista, Mary, Laurie, Kirsten, Penny, and Thomas) who pour extravagant creativity and prayer and effort into leading ministries like Youth, Sunday Hospitality, Children, and Music. I also want to acknowledge the Directors (Ed, Julie, Tracey, Roar, David, and Guy) and their unseen yet profound service to Jesus Christ and his ministry in and through SJR. It is a privilege to walk alongside these servants so that we will continue to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness, wherever we happen to assemble.

It has been such a joy, and privilege, to have found myself at St. John's in 2019 – a fresh start in ministry with you at a time in life when many clergy hang up their robes for the last time, and join the lawn bowling club (a friend of mine seriously recommended this to me!). - Preaching. As St. Paul writes to the Church in Corinth, the faithful proclamation of Jesus Christ as Lord is the only way to bring people from darkness into light, and I'm very glad share in this!
- Lastly, working with Sean. We have known each other for over 30 years, serving together at St. John's (Shaughnessy) and with Inter-Varsity, in the 1990's. He is a true servant for Jesus' sake, and the most capable Senior Minister I have ever worked with.

Directors' Report

A brief reflection on Directors/ Trustees Meeting over 2019, by David Jones

There are several parts to getting church to 'work together'. Sunday meetings happen as well as they do because we work hard, and with attention, during the other 6 days.

We as Directors are attentive to, and must think and act carefully on such matters as:

Who in our congregation are flourishing, and who are in a steady state, and those who are in an environment of considerable change.

The financial record keeping, reporting, and the pressures on our offerings in relation to our expenses

The various 'in-house' programs of Sunday School, Adult Catechisms, Music and musician dynamics

Legal requirements that the larger society requires of us such as Criminal Record Checks, various Canada Revenue Requirements

Maintaining and ongoing improvement of our relationship with Trinity Lutheran Church

On going relationship(s) with the local and national Anglican expectations for our parish and Rev. Guy and Rev. Sean

Prayers of Discernment that the Spirit of Christ brings to us; sometimes such direction is very clear, other times much patience and effort is required to figure out first what The Lord would have us notice, and then what is the significance of the revelations.

I have read that farming, whether plant based or animal based, is NOT an Information Age Skill. Such an observation is a metaphor for our Church. We are not best understood by our reports and due diligences. They are important.

But lest we become some sort of sterile place of 'spirituality' where social pressures and growth are our measurements, your Directors take their responsibilities with 'fear and trembling'

¹⁴ so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes." (Eph 4:14)

Many pressures have flowed about us this year: Marriages, deaths, transitions of life, information of ongoing changes in our society and unexplained weather.

But we are in a church tradition that values silences and insight, abilities for non-activity, and time-tested worship instead of hectic amusements and checklists.

Directors may seem safe and secure, but we are like St. Paul, on his boat journeys: Thankful for the Lord who gives us purposes and protection, even when we are unsure.

Pray for the directors/trustees/deacons because our goal as part of the Church Universal ('As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be) is to support the activities and Christian Life in The Parish of St John's Richmond with discussions, votes, and prayers.

- 2. Quorum confirmed, 27 members were in attendance.

Confirmation of a quorum (a quorum is "the greater of Eight (8) members or 25% of the members then in good standing, present in person, and eligible to vote".) There are 89 members eligible to vote. A quorum in this case is 22 members.

 - Acknowledgement of the loss of Margaret Spasic who was a member of the congregation and died in last June, as well as acknowledging congregational members who have lost family members (Anna Cheung, Marion Price, Gordon Legeweg).
 - Overview of some of the ministries at SJR including the Children's Ministry, the support of the congregation in Honduras, and a variety of other areas where SJR provides ministry and support.
 - Reflection on 2 Corinthians 9:6, 10 11, the original context in the early church as well as the application for SJR.
 An encouragement to be generous in response to God's generosity. Especially as we bring on board a new Staff member.

- 13. Treasurer's Report (Roar Bakken, Treasurer)
 - 13.1. Adoption of 2018 Financial Statements
 - We had roughly \$48,000 in our account as of the end of December 2018. With outstanding expenses this results in approximately \$44,000 for the start of 2019.
 - Total expenses were \$175,000.
 - Total revenue was slightly less than the \$198,000, for a short fall of approximately \$23,000.
 - Approximately 80% of the expenses for 2019 relate to salaries, rent and other costs incurred in operations. These expenses are independent of the other activities of SJR.
 - Details of the 2018 Financial Statements were discussed and are contained in the 2018 Annual Report.

 - There was a discussion about what is included in the "church service expenses".

The adoption of the 2018 Financial Statements was approved.

13.2. Adoption of 2019 Budget

An overview of the proposed budget for 2019 was provided by Roar Bakken. The proposed 2019 was available at the beginning of the meeting.

- A balance of \$45,000 is needed at the beginning of each year to smooth income peaks and valleys, and to provide a buffer for any unexpected and urgent expenses.
- A need for additional pew bibles has been identified, this is likely where the discretionary funds will be focused.
- The Administrative line item has been increased by \$600 from last year, to allow for any unexpected expenses.

- There was discussion of the budget for Synod, and whether those funds will be sufficient given that the Synod will be in Ottawa. There was also discussion of whether the congregational member's air miles could be used to purchase tickets, and potential discount airlines with lower airfares.
- We are very good at keeping our expenses low. There is a need to support the 2019 both with time and financially.

The adoption of the 2019 Budget was approved.
