

December 15, 2024 The Third Sunday in Advent

(Evening Prayer, Book of Common Prayer, 1962)

Dear Friends: Welcome to St. John's! Athanasius, the 4th century Bishop of Alexandria, wrote a famous book (before he was 23 years old) called 'On the Incarnation of the Word'. The focus of the book is why Jesus had to come in human form. This is a helpful topic around Christmas, when we celebrate the anniversary of his entry into the world in human form (the "incarnation"). Here is a summary of the first half of the book from young Athanasius:

We have seen that to change the corruptible to incorruption was proper to none other than the Savior Himself, Who in the beginning made all things out of nothing; that only the Image of the Father could re-create the likeness of the Image in men, that none save our Lord Jesus Christ could give to mortals immortality, and that only the Word Who orders all things and is alone the Father's true and sole-begotten Son could teach men about Him and abolish the worship of idols.

Among the truths asserted in that quote is that Jesus did not come solely to remove and cleanse sin; he came to restore the image of God in us (to "re-create the likeness of the Image..."). Salvation is not simply rescue, but new creation. You may say, "Well, that's fine, but what does the image of God look like, anyway?" Athanasius, along with Scripture and church history, says that Jesus is the perfect image of God, in human form. Our great need and hope at Christmas is to recognize why Jesus came. The astonishing thing is not simply that Jesus came, but that he works in his followers to restore what once was lost, and to fulfill that restoration at his return.

Our Evening Prayer and Holy Communion services follow patterns set out in the Book of Common Prayer (BCP), developed in the 1500's during the English Reformation by Thomas Cranmer. About 88% of the BCP is directly taken from the Bible.

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desires not the death of sinners, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness, and live, has given power and commandment to his ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins.

He [God] pardons and absolves all them that truly repent and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore we beseech him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him which we do at this present, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
